5. <u>6:52 P.M</u> WORK SESSION # 4: CPA-21, POGUE SITE- SPECIFIC LAND USE PLAN & REZONING AMENDMENT

Ms. Schwartz presented the draft Planning Commission's findings that will be presented to the BoCC.

Commissioner Wheatley and Commissioner Pestinger were concerned that part of Commissioner Wheatley's findings were not added to the findings list. Ms. Schwartz assured the commission that the findings in the staff report would be sent to the BoCC. A further discussion arose surrounding the specific language to include in the recommendation letter. The commissioners decided to add sections for critical oaks and Land Use Goal 1 Policy B. 10 in the recommendation letter.

6. 7:24 PM WORK SESSION # 4 LONG-TERM AGRICULTURE ZONING UPDATE

Ms. Arai and Ms. Teeple presented the summary of decisions from the July 5th work session as well as current decision points needed from the Planning Commission during this work session. The Planning Commission's first decision point is whether to revise policy language to protect prime farmland soils while accommodating mining accessory uses. Discussion ensued, and a majority ruled by thumbs to change the policy language.

The next decision for the Planning Commission is to include class 4w soils and class 4s soils. Ms. Arai explained to the committee that the "w" stands for wetness in the soil, and the "s" stands for soil limitations. The class 4w soils represent approximately 15% of the baseline acreage. Priority habitat for the Oregon Spotted Frog, seasonally wet woodlands, or the area contains wetlands with limited ag use allowed in the dry season. Class 4s represented 26% baseline acreage, stony soils, and are prone to drought. These soils are habitats for the pocket gopher, checkerspot butterfly, and vesper sparrow. Soil is conserved through the Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP), sentinel lands, and other state/federal prairie conservation efforts. Commissioner Halverson asked if the county counted the state Capitol Forest or land from JBLM in the figures. Ms. Arai states that soil within those areas is not included in the XYZ scenarios presented previously.

Chair Casino asked to split the decision as a few commissioners agreed they don't feel it is appropriate to tell a citizen what to do with their land if they are in an area containing 4s soils. Commissioner Nelson mentioned the 4s soils you can at least winter cattle on, but the 4w soils would be too wet. Commissioner Simmons asked if the 4w soils were not included if Commissioner Nelson would feel okay about that. Commissioner Nelson stated he would be fine. Chair Casino asked the rest of the group how they felt. A thumb vote was taken, and the majority agreed to remove the 4w soils. Commissioner Wheatley stated she had no opinion on the matter due to wanting further public feedback first. Commissioner Pestinger agreed with Commissioner Wheatley.

 Commissioner Halverson asked about the 4s soils and what types of agriculture are happening on those soils currently. Ms. Arai stated it is too difficult to map those without having a particular category. Commissioner Halverson asked if it is known what categories of 4s soils are more prone to agriculture than others. Ms. Arai said there were five soil types, one of which hardly has acreage. The other four are the Indianola's five to fifteen, Indianola zero to five, Spanaway gravely standalone zero to three if irrigated, and Spanaway Nisqually complex two to ten percent if irrigated. Her understanding is the prairies are more in the Spanaway Nisqually and Spanaway Gravely areas. Commissioner Halverson asked what percentage that. Ms. Arai stated 4800 acres in the baseline. He asked about the percentage of the 4800 acres that are currently being farmed. Ms. Arai stated she was not sure, and it would be hard to map due to having to use a specific scenario that is in an open space ag.

Commissioner Wheatley stated she was asked to call out the Spanaway Nisqually complex and Spanaway Gravelly Sandy Loam as being the ones to include. Ms. Arai states another hole to what is currently being farmed is if those lands have access to irrigation.

The Planning Commissioners were unable to reach a decision about the 4s soil types. Chair Casino asked if there was further information the group would like to see from staff to help decide. Commissioner Day asked if staff could bring back the current ag use on the 4s soil types. That would help him.

The third decision for the Planning Commission is the Agricultural Designation Criteria. How much percentage of the parcel must be prime soils? Seventy-five percent, fifty percent, or something that has not been considered by the stakeholders' workgroup. Commissioner Nelson asked if somebody has less than 75 percent, will their parcel be pulled out of long-term ag? Ms. Teeple states the current land that is already designated will not be adjusted. The reason for that is the number of currently enrolled parcels is seventy-five to ninety percent, as actively working lands and soils are considered a non-exclusive criterion for designation. The majority of the Planning Commission voted for the percentage of a parcel must be 75% or greater prime farm soil. The majority of the Planning Commission wanted to keep the predominant parcel size at 20 acres. The next designation criteria decision was what should the block size be. The majority of the Planning Commission agreed to 40+ acres. Planning Commission was not ready to decide on code updates for LTA.
