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5. 6:44 P.M: WORK SESSION #6: LONG-TERM AGRICULTURAL ZONING UPDATE

Ms. Teeple reviewed previous decisions made at the July 5th and July 19th planning commission meetings. There are a few remaining decision points: the first decision point is on code changes for flexibility and clarity; the second is whether to exclude 4s soils altogether or to exclude the 4s soils if the National Commodity Crop Productivity Index (NCCPI) productivity rating is below 0.5.

Ms. Arai presented a summary of code updates, including expanding uses in the long-term agriculture zoning district. This change would give farmers flexibility to diversify income, strengthen the agriculture economy, and streamline permit processes. She also spoke about an update to the agritourism overlay district, which helps to clarify uses and development standards, remove barriers like minimum parcel size and streamline permit processes.

Commissioner Simmons asked if adding cannabis to the proposed primary uses is something that was discussed. Ms. Arai states that cannabis has its own chapter in the Thurston County Codes, and it is not currently treated as agriculture. It could be something that is reviewed; however, it would take place as a separate docket item. This update on agriculture zoning is narrow in scope and did not go to stakeholders around cannabis. Mr. Davis added historical knowledge of why cannabis has not been considered an agricultural use at the time regulations were adopted. Ms. Teeple states that there is an application for a code amendment that will be presented as a docket item in 2024. Commissioner Day asks if addressing the use of cannabis for agriculture use in the Planning Commissions' finding would help support the BoCC adding this to their docket. Commissioner Pestinger and Chair Casino were in support of the idea. Commissioner Pestinger asks about agritourism and parcel size. Ms. Arai voiced the updated code that was presented does not have a minimum parcel size. Commissioner Day questioned special use language in code 20.08A.025 "or cannot be readily accessed without adversely affecting the primary agriculture use." He believed there could be a benefit in addition to "or due to other sight constraints as in a wetland buffer other than the primary farmland would make it hard to site." Ms. Arai agreed and stated that language is more than just in special uses and is also used for secondary uses under 20.08A.022. The purpose of that language is that somebody has a critical use area or a different designation in the far corner of their parcel that is still designated at LTA. Chair Casino noticed that horses are being moved out of special use; however, canines are not. Ms. Teeple mentioned that kennels historically have been considered a special use in Chapter 20.54 for agriculture and other zones. She noted that when commercial kennels apply, it goes to the Hearing Examiner, where it can receive public feedback and have a public hearing process. There has been interest in commercial kennels from the public in the past, so the Hearing Examiner process is appropriate.

Commissioner Halverson motions to recommend approval of agricultural zoning update and amendment designation criteria as discussed by previous Planning Commission decision points and further move to recommend and approval of associated code changes in chapters 20.03, 20.08A, 20.08G, and 20.54 to increase flexibility for agricultural operations, streamline the permit process, and clarify procedures to include the cannabis recommendation by Commissioner Day. Commissioner Simmons seconds the

motion. Commissioner Pestinger moves to table the motion until later in the meeting when 4s soils are discussed. Chair Casino tables motion.

Ms. Arai and Ms. Teeple presented 4s soil types and answered previous questions about what the existing 4s soil types are. Commissioner Wheatley asks what the three soil types are. Ms. Teeple said the Spanaway gravelly sandy loam, the Spanaway -Nisqually complex, and the Nisqually loamy fine sand. Each has a rating from the NCCPI of 0.5 or higher. Commissioner Wheatley asked if there were any other soil types that are in existing farms that did not meet the NCCPI criteria that were used. Ms. Arai stated that the Indianolas, which are typically the area that transitions from the prairies to the woodland. When those were looked at, the NCCPI rating was much lower than the three mentioned in the previous comment. The estimated acreage for the two Indianolas equals approximately 6,000 total acres, and they are made up of approximately 20 and 34 percent of existing farms.

Commissioner Pestinger moves to include the three 4s soil types that have the NCCPI rating over 0.5. Commissioner Wheatley seconds. With a vote of 5-2, the motion passes.

Chair Casino restates the previous motion to include the 4s soils.

Move to recommend approval of the agriculture zoning update and amendment to designation criteria as discussed by previous Planning Commission decision points. Further move to recommend approval of associated code changes to Chapters 20.03, 20.08a,20.08G, and 20.54 to increase flexibility for agricultural operators, streamline permit processes, and clarify procedures, which included the three 4s soil types as well as Commissioner Day's finding on cannabis and hemp. With a vote of 5-2 the motion passes.

Chair Casino asked to have Ms. Arai write a separate resolution that the Planning Commissioner would like to see the BoCC work on a compensation program for citizens who have a loss of development rights. Ms. Arai responded that staff could put something together and could tie it to The Habitat Strategic Initiative Lead Grant that the County should be getting a draft contract from the state.
