5. <u>6:43 P.M. WORK SESSION #7: Thurston 2045 – Commerce Climate Presentation</u> (Staff: Sarah Fox, Dana Bowers, Ashley Arai)

Ms. Fox from the Department of Commerce provided information about the legislative updates to include a Climate Element in the Comprehensive Plan. Commissioner Wheat-ley wanted clarification on what "climate sector" and "searchable attributes" refer to.
Ms. Fox responded climate sectors are 11 topics, such as water resources, waste management, and forestry, identified by the University of Washington.

Commissioner Halverson asked whether the County would work with cities with populations over 6,000 to create a climate plan through the Comprehensive Plan. Ms. Bowers stated that proposals to work together have been made to jurisdictions; however, most jurisdictions work independently due to the timing of their respective Comprehensive Plan updates. Ms. Arai stated a regional group convenes for the climate mitigation plan. Ms. Harvey added that the collaboration they are working on is a greenhouse gas reduction plan. The plan has targets shared among the four jurisdictions.

Commissioner Wheatley asked what the different requirements the county and cities have under HB 1181 are. Ms. Fox responded that the difference depends on local government size, which determines what parts of the element are required. A distinction was made between optional and required changes.

Commissioner Day mentioned transportation retrofit planning for environmental reasons that is being completed by TRPC. Ms. Fox answered that DOT will be providing transportation data to local governments for Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) as well.

 Commissioner Wheatley asked if there is a change to greenhouse gas emissions monitoring parameters. Ms. Fox answered that the guidance is broad to allow jurisdictions to choose their own parameters and that more datasets are being developed by state agencies to provide metrics for greenhouse gas emissions. She mentioned the CalEEMod Tool used in California.

Commissioner Wheatley asked about the best available science for critical areas. Ms. Fox answered that there may be some changes to improve clarity in the WAC to include a statement about the best available science.

Commissioner Pestinger asked how many jurisdictions in Washington have declared a climate emergency. Ms. Fox was unsure and stated that the Municipal Research Services Center has been tracking different climate bills and resources that have been adopted throughout the state.

Commissioner Pestinger asked Ms. Fox how she would respond to citizens who say the climate action is "too little too late." Ms. Fox answered that she did not have a comment on that idea specifically. Commerce works for the legislature and carries out what they have made law. Commissioner Day commented that current funding and efforts should be focused on implementation rather than the comprehensive plan. Ms. Fox clarified that the initial round of funding would be limited to planning activities and that future funding allocation would be based on goals and policies in the comprehensive plan. Ms. Bowers mentioned the plan to spend limited funding on the comprehensive plan updates and allow for more funding on implementation planning.

Commissioner Pestinger asked how the Department of Commerce defines overburdened 1 2 communities. Ms. Fox replied that there is a new definition in law. She brought up the 3 Environmental Health Disparities Map that DHSH has online and said that the focus is 4 on high-index areas. 5 6 Commissioner Wheatley asked about Climate Policy Team membership and participation. Ms. Fox answered that it is not required to leave communities the flexibility to im-7 8 plement according to their capacity. Ms. Arai added that the county's outreach strategy 9 is to engage audiences that are underrepresented, and that engagement will be multifac-10 eted. 11 12 Other Business 13 14 8:08 P.M. Kevin Jen-17 sen has taken the role of Agriculture Manager, which will fill the last vacant role within 18 19 Community Planning. The industrial lands study was presented to the BoCC. The brief-20 ing is available on the Thurston County YouTube channel. 21 22 Ms. Arai mentioned that the County has met with tribal entities to discuss Thurston 2045. The goal is to meet monthly. Their priorities include environment, natural re-23 sources, transportation, and land use. Their interest is also in water rights and watershed 24 25 planning.
