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Commissioner Pestinger referred to the presented timeline, clarified chapter ten as being about historic resources only, and wondered if the climate and housing resources chapter would be presented at the same meeting. Ms. Davis stated they would cover how the chapters would be approached due to their complexity. Ms. Arai added what would be ready for review at the next meeting. Vice Chair Hansen inquired about the chapter numbers for both housing and climate elements. Ms. Arai stated that the housing chapter has a number; however, the climate chapter does not because it is new. She will add the chapter numbers to lessen the confusion about their work. Vice Chair Hansen agreed.

Commissioner Bumbarger stated that the document used his and her pronouns and wondered if there was an attempt to revise it with gender-neutral language. Ms. Davis asked where he noticed them in the document. Commissioner Bumbarger pointed to an example in the document. Mr. Boughan mentioned that staff will clean up the document after reviewing each chapter. Ms. Arai added that the staff created a running list of minor edits to the document. That suggestion will be added to the list to identify the edits needed as different staff work on various chapters.

Commissioner Pestinger asked about Appendix A and wanted clarification on whether the discussion on the content was appropriate during the meeting. Ms. Davis stated that the staff is looking for a thumbs up on the changes made, and then that chapter will be set aside for now. Ms. Arai added that staff reached out to the Squaxin, Nisqually, and Chehalis tribes and asked to include a narrative for their tribe. The Squaxin tribe provided one, which was included in the appendix. The other tribes may do so at their discretion.

Commissioner Casino mentioned he looked through the list of programs and documents referenced in the appendix. Often, he has seen the language "You can purchase this from TRPC." He continued that most citizens wouldn't want to purchase documents and wanted to ensure anything linked would be available to the community members and the Planning Commission. Ms. Davis stated that the information would be available to the public and the Planning Commission. Further discussion ensued surrounding older documents that may only have a hard copy available and fees associated with printing out documents.

Commissioner Pestinger cited Appendix C, page C-22 Section F: The Olympia Airport Master Plan. He believed that should fall under transportation section A. He wondered if that should be in the discussion since the transportation chapter will go through a revision during the periodic update. Ms. Davis said the change was made during the 2021 Tumwater Joint Plan Update by reconfiguring landing pattern zones. Ms. Arai asked if the Planning Commission wanted the airport referenced in Appendix C, the transportation chapter. Further discussion occurred about how the Olympia Airport, which falls under the Port of Olympia jurisdiction, would be referenced in the Comprehensive Plan.

Commissioner Hansen mentioned the introduction to chapter one and wanted to discuss the language chosen. He would like to see stronger language regarding climate stewardship. The commissioners continued the discussion of Commissioner Hansen's idea, ultimately deciding to have staff revise the introduction paragraph.

Commissioner Pestinger cited the county's history and what was missing. He mentioned Chief Leschi and his story's inclusion in the county's history, even if the tribe does not offer it. He continued that history generally includes stories of the area's founding "fathers"; however, the workers rarely are mentioned. He pointed out the area's strong movements surrounding logging and unionization history. He mentioned The Wobblies and The Centralia Massacre. While that event was not in Thurston County, many similar events happened here. He would like to see some of the more significant events included. Ms. Davis asked for a list of references for use. He stated he would provide them. Ms. Arai added that staff attended the Nisqually River Council Meeting. Once the chapters are close to completion, the staff has a meeting scheduled for a larger conversation regarding the Comprehensive Plan. She spoke about the running list of questions established and will ask if they would like to include Chief Leschi's story in the appendix. It was their preference to omit it at the time. Further discussion ensued surrounding historical events in the county and what may and may not be appropriate to include in Appendix A.

Commissioner Nelson had some concerns surrounding the negative connotation the word "occupation" could have. Ms. Davis asked for a replacement word. Further discussion took place about the need to change the wording. Ultimately, the group decided to remove the subheadings and keep the word for continuity throughout Appendix A. Ms. Davis asked Commissioner Pestinger to email staff the references he mentioned.

6. 7:16 P.M. INDUSTRIAL LANDS STUDY

(Staff: Andrew Boughan)

 Mr. Boughan presented the Industrial Lands Study to the Planning Commission. Commissioner Pestinger asked if the study considered what warehouses could be used for and whether those alternative businesses were included in that subset. Ms. Arai answered no. believing the consultants had looked at the different industrial codes. That, combined with transportation, looked at the large-scale warehouse distribution centers with larger parcels and highway access. She mentioned that the consultant team worked backward from where they saw employment growth trends across the state. The BoCC had not set any direction on how they wanted to see industrial growth in the county. The consultants were tasked with working backward from the trends they saw and provided different scenarios for the BoCC and the community to discuss what they would like to see. Commissioner Casino asked if when the consultant looked at the inventory, they were determined by use or the zoning. Ms. Arai stated it was industrial land zoning. Commissioner Hansen asked what number of acres are available to the county now. Mr. Boughan answered the county has nineteen hundred acres available. There are fifteen hundred net developable acres. The remaining four hundred acres represent undeveloped land due to flood plains, public ownership, critical areas, and the like.

 Commissioner Bumbarger clarified whether the study showed that the need was not more than what was currently available. Ms. Arai replied that the study found that the nuances of what is available and what will be needed will highly depend on the county's economic development plan and vision. There may not be enough land of a particular size or readily available access to utilities. Looking only at acreage is not enough to determine the land available for the specific type of economic development the county may want to see.

Further discussion succeeded regarding the demand for industrial lands, the parcel size, access to utilities, and what docket projects were included in the study. Commissioner Halverson asked if the available nineteen hundred acres excluded lands that have agricultural use. Ms. Arai stated that the study would have included the land zoned industrial regardless of the use.

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Commissioner Pestinger spoke about employment opportunities and the type of jobs warehousing may bring to a county. He referenced Commissioner Hansen's story from a year ago stating he remembered Lewis County concluding that growing warehouses and warehouse jobs were not good for the local economy at all and asked Commissioner Hansen to share the story. Commissioner Hansen explained the details of the story for the new planning commissioners. Ms. Arai said that the study touched on the history of wages in the warehouse and manufacturing field in Thurston County. Discussion followed, which included topics such as jobs versus employment, pay gaps, and the state's median income related to Thurston County.

Chair Day asked how far off the mark the county is in terms of the types of parcels and utilities available. How much of a reduction in the number of acres available? Ms. Arai replied that the staff does not have the technical skill to speculate whether the county is optimal in terms of utility readiness. The number in the study reflected county-wide, including in the cities, UGAs, and rural areas. She continued that public comment supporting any policy made by the county to take active steps in establishing new areas of economic development where utilities are needed and mitigating for critical areas would be the best route. Commissioner Day clarified that the policies wouldn't be pulling in new industrial lands; it would be incentivizing the development of the land, and then the utility expansion would have to be a part of that. Ms. Arai referred to Maytown and the surrounding area zoned for industrial use. However, the land could be underutilized if not connected to sewer or water. Ms. Arai mentioned Appendix F of the Industrial Lands Study and how it broke down the number of parcels available per size and whether they are utility-ready. Further discussion followed regarding traffic, quality of jobs, storm/wastewater treatment facilities, and previous docket projects.

7. <u>8:06 P.M.</u> General Thurston 2045 Update

(Staff: Ashely Arai)

 Ms. Arai explained that the climate and housing meetings between staff and the consultant team have happened. The consultants are trying to map out an outreach strategy to reach community members in the south county. The staff is considering an open house summit in the Grand Mound/Rochester and Yelm area in the first or second week of June. The date will be shared with the Planning Commission once established. Commissioner Pestinger asked who the regulatory oversight is of the Chehalis Western Trail within Thurston County and if that falls within the Comprehensive Plan. He brings up the topic due to the advancement of electronic/combustion engine bikes and scooters. Mr. Boughan replied that it would not fall within the comprehensive plan. It would likely fall within the Parks Department's general rules or policies, and the enforcement would fall under the sheriff's department.

8. 8:10 P.M. STAFF UPDATES

(Staff: Andrew Boughan, Ashely Arai)

Ms. Arai announced that a senior planning position was posted. She continued that the role would focus on engagement and strategic planning. The person who fills the role will oversee the Education and Outreach team and the employees who work on policy. She also included an update on the new county manager's first day of employment and invited the Planning Commission to the meet and greet on April 5 from 4:30–6:00 P.M.

Mr. Boughan mentioned that the comprehensive and developmental dockets comment period has closed and provided the next steps. He highlighted that over thirteen hundred comments were received in the comment period, much higher than in any previous cycle. He attributed the influx of comments to a new survey-style comment form, a consolidated webpage, and the outreach effort from the county staff and other parties of interest.
